Grant-writer Anthony Butera stated the grant application was a joint effort of the Society's Board members, all of whom contributed information, data and ideas. The Society's museum complex, located at 115 Prospect Street Port Jefferson, has 11 building containing exhibits about Long Island and Port Jefferson History. The exhibits include Long Island's premier clock collection of over 200 time pieces, the historic Mather House, a prominent shipbuilders furnished home with permanent and rotating exhibits, plus an extensive collection of 18th and 19th Century tools, a Post Office, Barber Shop, Country Store and the Marine Barn that details Long Island's colorful history of ship building.

The Museum complex is open Wednesday through Sundays from May to October 12:00 pm to 4:00 pm and there is no charge for admission.
